# Emfan Pay

Year Five launched Term 5 with an incredible Ancient Egyptian Day! The children (and adults) looked spectacular in their pharoah finery and as glamourous gods and goddesses. During our day, we learnt about Howard Carter and began to explore our Question of Discovery, 'Were all Ancient Egyptians like Tutankhamun?'

To learn about the importance of the transition to the afterlife, we studied funerary masks and created our own. We decided to imagine we were wealthy citizens or pharaohs, by using precious metals such as gold and silver to make our masks, rather than wood or plaster, which would have been used for less wealthy people's masks. We also practised using hieroglyphs and made decorative cartouches which displayed our names. We quickly came to the conclusion that we would stick to using our alphabet in future!

Despite it only being the beginning of our topic, we displayed an impressive amount of knowledge about this time period during our scavenger hunt quiz. What a way to launch our topic - we can't wait to discover more!
