Preparation for an Earthquake

Earthquakes are never predictable and can have a large death toll but there is the way to survive is to be prepared and you can be, just by following these 4 simple steps:

1) First of all, look for hazards or loose pieces of furniture around the house so that cover in your home is easily accessible, and to keep you safe, for you and your family.

2) Next, it is widely recommended that you and your family memorize all emergency contacts to ensure you can reach your emergency services in the unfortunate event of destruction-causing earthquakes.

3) Make an emergency kit/medical kit. This can include tinned food, water, a source of light, a spare change of clothes, a wireless radio, spare shoes, a map of your neighbourhood and including a safe route around hazards, medical equipment and anything to ensure the safety of you and your community.

4) Finally, and most importantly, practice earthquake drills and your emergency escape routes so that for one uncertainty panics or becomes unresponsive with their choices.

*Steps to survive

Now, if your neighbourhood is ever threatened by disaster, you know the correct way to stay safe and protected in the this horrific event. So practice thoroughly and remain cautious as this guide could very well save your life and do as well as the others in your community. Just remember drop, cover, hold on!

*Steps to survive catastrophic earthquakes.

1) First of all, ensure you listen out for advice from local authorities about when is best to carry on with your day. As this is vital, it is more of a reason to have a radio/way to listen to your local news in your emergency kit.

2) It is essential that wherever you are when a brisbane earthquake strikes, you remain there. If you are inside any structure, rapidly make your way to a table or a sturdy piece of furniture and 'Drop, Cover and Hold on'. If this a table is not nearby, a bathtub is a suitable replacement.

3) However, if you happen to be outside and the ground begins to violently tremble, stay an equal distance from any possible falling debris and shattering glass to prevent any serious injuries.

Top Tip

- It is best to keep phones fully charged at all times in case of a catastrophe and if you are in need to contact your local authorities.
- Ensure that your emergency supplies and medical kit are in an easily accessible place at all times.
- Most importantly, make sure that the danger has passed before carrying on with your day. The danger will usually be signalled by a siren, so listen intently.

Homework

In line with the school's Homework Policy, children in Year 6 are expected to complete two tasks on SATs Companion:

- English and maths (30 minutes to one hour)

They also need to complete:

- Reading (daily for at least 20 minutes). Please complete the Reading Record Book to show that your child has read. It is also important to try to read with your child at least two times a week.
- Reading Plus (30 minutes to one hour)

Homework tasks are set each week on a Monday and must be completed by the following Monday.

If children are finding it difficult to complete the tasks on time, please speak to us and we will support them in school.

The importance of Reading

A growing body of evidence...consistently links **reading for pleasure** with a wide range of benefits, from **improved academic outcomes** and **future employment prospects** to **enhanced mental wellbeing**.

(see, e.g. Sullivan & Brown, 2015; WPI, 2021; Sun et al., 2023).



Figure 1: Percentage of children and young people aged 8 to 18 who enjoyed reading in their free time either very much or quite a lot from 2005 to 2024

In 2024, just 34.6% of over 1 million children questioned said that they enjoyed reading in their free time very much or quite a lot. In 2005, the figure was 51.4%.

There was an almost 10% decrease in children who enjoy reading in their free time between 2023-2024.

How can we support children with their reading?



Read to your child (even though they might think they're too old!)



Read alongside your child.

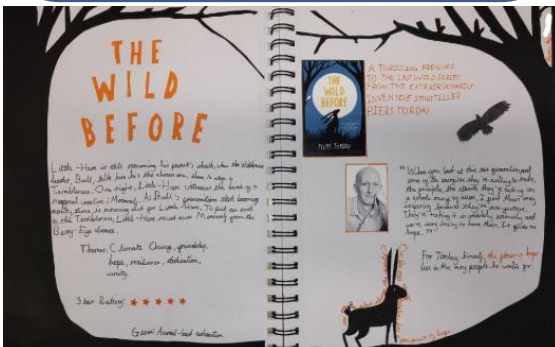
Support your child with creating an imaginative page or two for a reading scrap book.



Be a role model by reading and talking about what you have read.



Borrow books (including audio books) from the local library.



How can we support children with their reading?



Encourage your child to borrow an ambitious, age-appropriate book from our Reading Trees and earn a Bronze, Silver and Gold Reading Tree Award!

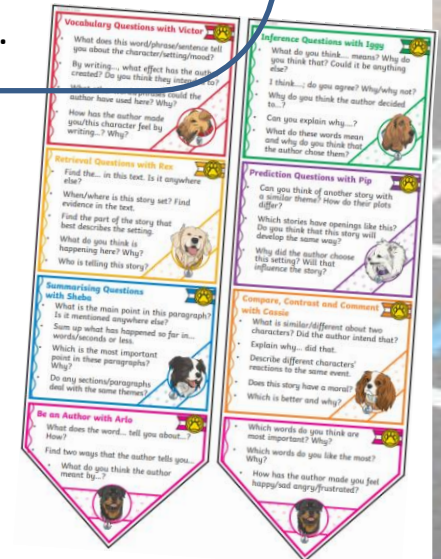
Fill in your child's reading record and encourage them to do the same. This is a written record filled in by teachers, adults at home and children to share and celebrate the children's reading progress.



Ask questions about the books your child is reading.

You might ask them to:

- Summarise what they have read,
- Share their favourite part,
- Describe their favourite (and least favourite) character,
- Explain why they think the author chose a particular word or phrase.



Reading Trees!

- There are 38 high quality books in each class.
- The list of these books can be found on the school website.
- The aim is for children to read 20 books to earn a Gold Certificate.
- If they read 10 books, they can earn a Silver Certificate.
- If they read 5 books, they can earn a Bronze Certificate!
- Children can read these books to you, and you can read them to your child.
- Books can be taken home, but we ask that they are well looked after and returned! Teachers from each class will be monitoring which books are going home.
- Children will be encouraged to take responsibility to record when they have read each book, so they know when they have completed the challenge!



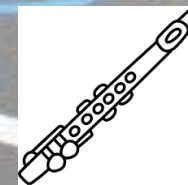
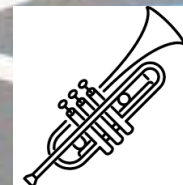
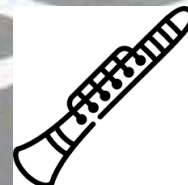
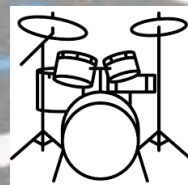
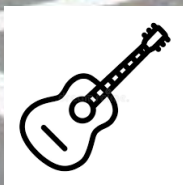
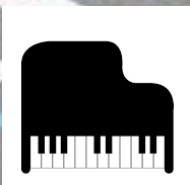
Healthy School

- As a healthy school, we ask that break time snacks are healthy.
- Children are instructed not to share break time snacks or items from their packed lunches due to allergy risks.
- Acceptable snacks include fruit, vegetables, cheese or breadsticks.
- Quick reminder: we are a nut-free school.
- Snacks which are not permitted include: crisps, popcorn, sweets, cakes, biscuits, sweet treats, high sugar content fruit winders.



Co-curricular music

- All children from year 1 to 6 have the opportunity to learn a range of instruments as part of the school's co-curricular offer.
- Lessons are delivered by independent peripatetic tutors and take place during the school day.
- The tutors liaise with class teachers and rotate lesson times each term to avoid children missing the same subjects.
- Children can choose to learn the piano, violin, electric guitar, clarinet, flute, cornet, trumpet, saxophone, classical guitar or continue with the ukulele.
- Children can also learn to play as part of a band selecting either drums, keyboard, lead guitar, bass guitar or vocals - with iRock.

SATs Tests

- Week commencing Monday 10th May.
- English – SPAG test (spelling, punctuation and grammar).
- Reading comprehension test.
- Writing – Teacher assessment of writing throughout the year.
- Maths – Paper 1 - Arithmetic, Paper 2 and 3 – Reasoning.
- Although we help to fully prepare children for these tests, we still ensure they receive a broad and balanced curriculum.

Medication

- At The Discovery School we are happy to support children who require medication. **However, where possible we ask that medication is administered at home.**
- If the medication required is part of a wider medical condition, it may be that your child would require a care plan. Someone from the medical team will be in touch should it be appropriate to write one for your child.
- If medication does need to be administered at school, we ask that you adhere to the following:
 1. Please complete a medication administration permission form (a paper copy can be obtained from the office).
 2. If the medication is prescribed to your child, your child's name and the dosage should be visible.
 3. Please hand medication directly to the School Office, please do not put it in a child's book bag. If you need the medication back at the end of the day to administer at home, then please collect from the School Office.

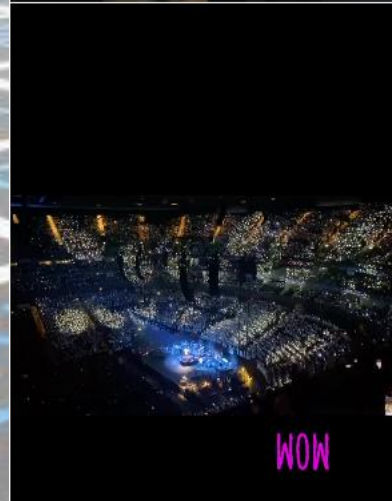

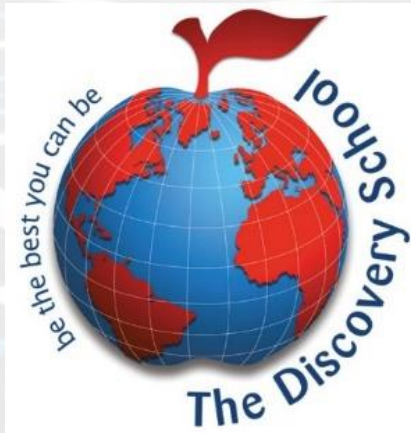
