


USEFUL INFORMATION




BUILDING INDEPENDENCE

Getting dressed/changed for sports clubs independently.





BELONGINGS

In Year I we go to Forest School in Term I and Term 3!


This means the children would have experienced all four Seasons in the Forest.

In Term 1, past experiences have been very muddy! Wet suits and wellingtons have been essential.


In Term 3, Past experiences have been cold! Very cold. Wellingtons with snow socks are essential or trainers which can get muddy.


Layers, coats and plenty of spares are essential.





Literacy and Mathematics in Year I






IMPACT OF READING

This chart shows the impact reading at home, for just 20 minutes a night can have on a child's learning. It is staggering the difference 20 minutes per day can make.

Why read 20 minutes at home?



THE IMPORTANCE OF READING

A growing body of evidence...consistently links **reading for pleasure** with a wide range of benefits, from **improved academic outcomes** and **future employment prospects** to **enhanced mental wellbeing**.

(see, e.g. Sullivan & Brown, 2015; WPI, 2021; Sun et al., 2023).



Figure 1: Percentage of children and young people aged 8 to 18 who enjoyed reading in their free time either very much or quite a lot from 2005 to 2024

In 2024, just 34.6% of over I million children questioned said that they enjoyed reading in their free time very much or quite a lot. In 2005, the figure was 51.4%.

There was an almost 10% decrease in children who enjoy reading in their free time between 2023-2024.

TIPS FOR READING

It should not be a battle!

 Choose a good time, space and head space to read. Some parents listen to their child read in the car, while cooking dinner or during breakfast.


 If your child is struggling you read a page/line to them and they read one to you.

If your child keeps stumbling on the same word when they reach
it your read it to them or you read a page and read the word
incorrectly – can they catch you out.

Use a timer, How much can you read in 5 minutes?

- Practical investigations using manipulatives – numicon, counters, real life.








SCHOOL VALUES AND REWARDS


